In September I was excited to attend the National Village to Village Network Conference along with board member and PR & Communications Chair Timi Kirchner. Over three days we were able to learn and share experiences with other folks from over 130 different villages.

The conference theme was Connecting
Generations, so programs that connect villages to
their local elementary school and college campuses
were featured, along with a keynote address by
author Marc Freedman (How to Live Forever).
Freedman shared that a key indicator of success in
a young person's life is an adult who is irrationally
crazy about them. It is that support that builds
resiliency in a young person. As people are
increasingly driven towards relationships in later
life, folks report three times greater happiness
when connected across generations. It's a win-win
when generations come together - something for
all of us to consider.


We also heard from Peter Kenyon of Kalamunda Seniors Hub in Australia. Peter stated succinctly what we know to be true - villages are effective and impactful because our benefits are not done to people, they are not done for people, but rather are facilitated of and by people. The village model of self-directed independence through interdependence brings out purpose and connection in a different way than less participatory support.

Other topics on repeat throughout the conference were the risks of social isolation, the necessity of addressing equity and inclusion, the benefits of collaborations and partnerships, the importance of scaling the village model, and the value of our villages in providing the social infrastructure that bridges the gap between what people need and what they can afford. Villages are a life-affirming model of social change ready to grow.

With the change in seasons already here, now is the time to consider requesting assistance for those colder weather preparations around the house. Volunteers are available to help with such tasks as:

- ✓ Removing A/C units from windows.
 - ✓ Closing or placement of storm windows.
 - ✓ Relocating outdoor plants or planters inside or
 - ✓ To protected areas.
 - Clearing the yard of leaves or fallen branches.
 - ✓ Moving lawn furniture to storage.

Ask Just One Call to help with routine tasks also such as:

- ✓ Simple household repairs that have been deferred.
- ✓ Replacing out of reach light bulbs and batteries.
- ✓ Transportation needs for appointments, shopping, travel to Harrisburg airport or the Amtrak station, or to Downtowner events.
- ✓ Technical assistance with computers, printers, phones, TVs, that torment us when they fail



We don't promise that our volunteers will always be able to resolve the issue you call about, but we will direct you to recommended professionals or vendors who can. Calling at least 24 hours ahead also gives time to find an available volunteer. Please leave a message if the Just One Call coordinator does not immediately answer the call.

During the weekend of October 5-6 Lancaster was alive with activity. ArtWalk was my destination. My first stop was the Demuth Museum at 120 E King Street where an exhibition exploring the life and work of Lancaster County artist, Henry Libhart will continue through November 10.

Mark your calendars! The 21st Annual Auction for Artists and Collectors will be hosted by the Demuth Museum and the Lancaster Museum of Art. Original artworks by renowned local and national artists will be auctioned off at the Imperial Ballroom at the Holiday Inn at 26 E Chestnut Street. Tickets at \$30 and your questions about the event can be answered by the museum staff at 717-299-9940.

Then I headed over to the Lancaster Museum of Art where, through October 26th, the Pennsylvania Watercolor Society's 40th International Juried Exhibition is under way. Work by many local artists are among the pieces exhibited.

Next I headed to the galleries. The annual Harvest Breakfast at Market attracted a lively crowd. I made my way through the Market alleys on my way to several

ArtWalk venues on Prince Street. The Galleries along Gallery Row (the 100 block of North Prince Street) had open doors with newly hung exhibits. Working artists gave talks and, because of the lovely weather, brought their easels out onto the sidewalks. This year there were 37 participants. It is a wonderful way to learn about the shops and alleyways of downtown as you wander and take in the works of local and regional artists.

Also for the second year we will be having a silent auction fundraiser, featuring a very interesting assortment of items and experiences offered up for bid.


I look forward to seeing everyone at the annual meeting.
